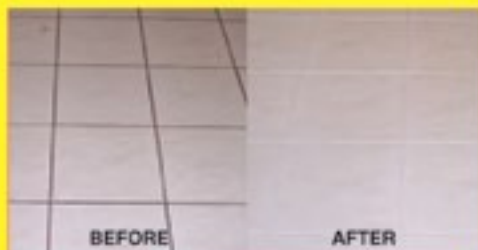


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Jupiter

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Inspired by the gods

The area where the town now sits was originally named for the Hobe Indian tribe which lived at the mouth of the Loxahatchee River, and whose name is also preserved in the name of nearby Hobe Sound. A mapmaker misunderstood the Spanish spelling “Jobe” of the Indian name “Hobe” and recorded it as “Jove”. Subsequent mapmakers further misunderstood this to be the Latin translation of the god Jupiter, and they anglicized the name from Jove to “Jupiter”. The Roman god Jupiter (or Zeus in the Greek mythology) is the chief Roman god, and god of light, of the sky and weather, and of the state and its welfare and its laws. Jupiter’s consort was Juno, inspiring a neighboring town to name itself “Juno Beach”.

The most notable landmark is the Jupiter Inlet Lighthouse, completed in 1860. The lighthouse is often used as the symbol for Jupiter.

Education

Public education is provided and managed by The School District of Palm Beach County. Jupiter is also home to several private and religious schools.

Jupiter’s population is served by two public high schools, Jupiter Community High School located in Jupiter, and William T. Dwyer High School, located in Palm Beach Gardens.

Jupiter Christian School is a private school located in the town.

According to the 2010 Census, Palm Beach County has a base population of 1,320,134, making it the third largest county in Florida behind Miami-Dade (2.49 million) and Broward (1.74 million). About 55 percent of Palm Beach County residents live in one of 38 municipalities, the remaining 587,844 living in unincorporated areas. The largest city both in area and population is West Palm Beach, which covers 52 square miles and has an incorporated population of 99,919. Boca Raton is second with 84,392 residents, followed by Boynton Beach, 68,217, Delray Beach, 60,522, and Wellington, 56,508. The county's smallest town in population is Cloud Lake with 135 residents. The smallest in area is Briny Breezes at just under one-half square mile.

According to historians, it is believed that the name "St. Lucie" was first given to this area by the Spanish. The name was given after the Spanish began construction of a fort on December 13 - the feast day of the Roman Catholic Saint Lucia.

The "Santa Lucia" colony was established somewhere between Vero Beach and Stuart around 1567, as old Spanish maps identify this area as Santa Lucia, which included roughly what is now known as Vero Beach to Stuart. The Spanish held Florida from 1783 to 1819. Seminoles (Creek Indians from Alabama and Georgia) and runaway slaves began to settle on the Treasure Coast. The Anglo-Saxon version, "St. Lucie," would not be officially used to identify the area until the 1900s. Between 2000 and 2010, St. Lucie was one of the fastest growing counties in the U.S. With a total population increase of more than 80,000 during that time frame, the demographics and labor force are diversifying into a more knowledge based economy. As of the 2013 Census Estimate, St. Lucie County is at a population of 286,832.

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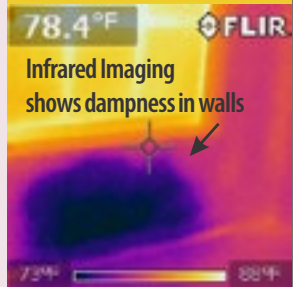

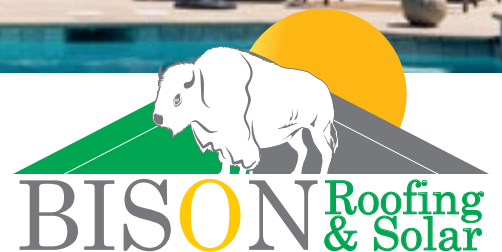

Whether on an ice hockey rink, in the jungles of South America or negotiating deals with presidents and princes worldwide, Russell DISE is the consummate competitive entrepreneur and the leading authority in the corporate aircraft leasing industry.

As president and founder of JetLease, the world's largest private aviation leasing company, DISE's career has spanned three decades of achievements. The company today, headquartered at Palm Beach International Airport in West Palm Beach, not only leases the finest aircraft but also offers sales, charters, aircraft management and financing.

Mr. DISE has participated in well over 1,000 aircraft transactions ranging from Fortune 100 companies, privately held companies, wealthy individuals and celebrities from various parts of the world. Transaction sizes range from \$2,500,000 to \$45,000,000, consisting mainly of Boeing, Gulfstream, Canadair, Raytheon, Lear and Citation products. JetLease will be involved in approximately 50 transactions a year with a total asset volume of approximately \$250,000,000.

An accomplished pilot flying Corporate Air Charter in the 80's, Mr. DISE understands the importance between the operational side and the financial intricacies of aircraft ownership. This unique mix of knowledge and experiences has enabled Mr. DISE to position JetLease as an industry innovator.

Over nine generations of Wyckoffs occupied the house up until 1901. In 1982, the house was restored and opened as the Wyckoff Museum. The museum website notes, "The Wyckoff surname is unique – so much so that the vast majority of American and Canadian Wyckoffs can trace their lineage to one of Pieter and Grietje's eleven children." Little did they know a future relation would be piloting planes above that historic homestead.

Humble Beginnings

"I started the company with \$80," said DISE, a native of Cleveland Heights, Ohio. That was 33 years ago. Like many successful entrepreneurs, success didn't happen overnight, or by accident. His is a story of determination, commitment and the combination of two of his greatest loves: Flying and hockey. He discovered the latter early on.

actor Hal Holbrook, hockey players Gary and Ryan Suter, former New York Yankees owner George Steinbrenner and movie director Joshua Logan. Among other things, "my time there helped me learn to focus," said DISE. Mr. DISE earned a BSBA in Accounting from The Ohio State University, where he played ice hockey and football, and then received a Graduate Degree from the Tax Executive Institute, Michigan State University. Mr. DISE



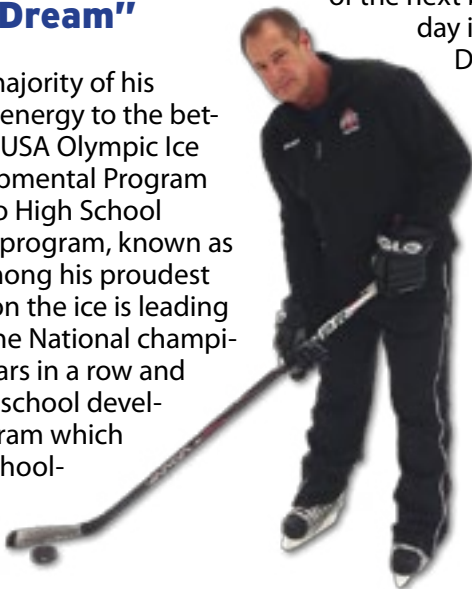
served as the Federal Tax Manager for a Fortune 100 company prior to his interest in the aircraft leasing, finance and sales industry.

In his pursuit of flying, Dise entered the Navy Officer Candidate School program, but was disqualified when doctors found he had a crushed sinus from years of playing hockey, which has since been repaired. Undaunted, he became a licensed private pilot and started flying on the side. That was when he and a buddy took \$80 and started a ground school. Typical of startups, it was a shoestring operation. "Our business phone was in my parents' house," Dise recalled.

But a chance meeting led to Dise working as a co-pilot for an Ohio cheese company making round trips to Denver. That led to an opportunity to broker an airplane sale. And that was the early beginning of JetLease, which has grown over those 33 years to broker over 1,000 transactions for major corporations and the rich and famous, with satellite operations world-wide.

Dise invests a majority of his spare time and energy to the betterment of The USA Olympic Ice Hockey Developmental Program and to The Ohio High School All-Star hockey program, known as Team Ohio. Palm Beach County

The three major multibillion-dollar industries in Palm Beach County are tourism, construction and agriculture. There are also many high-tech industries such as bioscience that contribute to the growing economy

- Tourism accounts for more than 53,530 jobs in Palm Beach County; in excess of 7 percent of the county's workforce earns a living from tourism related businesses such as hotels, restaurants, stores and transportation services and others.
- According to a 2004 study, 7.2 million people visited Palm Beach County, and they spent \$2.83 billion while they were here. Lodging accounted for \$80 million; food and beverage \$353 million.
- Passenger traffic at Palm Beach International Airport totaled 6.8 million in 2006.
- Palm Beach County leads the nation in the production of sugar and fresh sweet corn. It is also Florida's leading producer of rice, bell peppers, lettuce, radishes,

Chinese vegetables, specialty leaf and celery.

- Palm Beach County produces roughly 18 percent of all sugar in the United States. It is the largest sugar-producing county in the nation and has roughly 400,000 acres of sugar cane, about 32 percent of the county's overall land.
- According to Enterprise Florida, Palm Beach County had the state's highest per capita annual income, \$55,311, compared with a statewide average of \$36,720.
- Palm Beach County is the only county in Florida awarded "AAA" bond ratings by Fitch, Moody's and Standard & Poor's.
- The Palm Beach County School District is the largest employer in Palm Beach County with approximately 22,144 employees. For the 2008–2009 school year, 169,454 students enrolled in public elementary, middle and high schools in the county.
- Florida's Enterprise Zone Program provides tax incentives to businesses lo-

cated within or hiring from within the zones. The state currently has 19 enterprise zones with two in Palm Beach County.

- Palm Beach County's Office of Small Business Assistance maintains a banking consortium with local lenders to make millions of dollars in low-interest loans available for small businesses.

Airport

Palm Beach County, through its Department of Airports, operates and maintains Palm Beach International Airport (PBI). On October 23, 1988, a new state of the art terminal building was dedicated and exists as a truly superb example of a user friendly, congestion free, modern airport. PBI has 28 aircraft gates with the potential for 24 additional gates at a later time. Palm Beach International Airport is conveniently located to serve the air trade area of Palm Beach County and the four surrounding counties. The airport is located 2.5 miles west of downtown West Palm Beach and just 3.5 miles west of Palm Beach. PBI is



situated adjacent to Interstate Highway 95 and is accessible from anywhere in Palm Beach County. Boca Raton is approximately 20 miles south and Jupiter is only 15 miles north.

A major new feature is the Customs and Immigration facility which is capable of handling 300 passengers per hour and aircraft up to the size of B747-400.

Martin County

The Stuart/Martin County Chamber of Commerce, along with the Palm City, Indiantown, Hobe Sound and Jensen Beach Chambers, plus the Business Development Board, and the Economic Council of Martin County - collaborate together with local, state, and federal agencies to assist existing businesses to expand. Also, in accordance with the Economic Element of the Martin County Comprehensive Growth Management

Plan, concerted efforts are being made as we attempt to broaden the economic base by targeting and attracting new businesses that will offer employment with a higher pay scale criterion. Manufacturing plays a big role in Martin County. There are approximately 15,000 Occupational Licenses issued in Martin County, with 40% to 50% of them "home office based", as a result, the economy is driven by several sectors.

The Marine industry with a variety of custom boat and yacht builders, along with the specialty items such as tuna towers and fighting chairs, to fishing lures, fishing charters, and other water related businesses make a substantial contribution. Agriculture is also a major contributor, with over 40,000 acres of citrus, and ranked in the top ten in the state for citrus and vegetable production. Sugar cane, ornamentals and cattle production, combined with an egg farm producing over 10 million dozen eggs per year, Payson Park Thoroughbred Training Center, a flour milling facility, a juice concentrate plant, round out the agriculture segment. Over 200 manufacturing businesses in 18 differ-

ent Standard Industrial Codes employ over 3,700 persons.

Other important contributors to the economy would be construction, hospitality / tourism, government, retail, medical and service type businesses. We have approximately 35 different businesses that employ over 100 people. We also have approximately 400 businesses that are woman or minority owned.

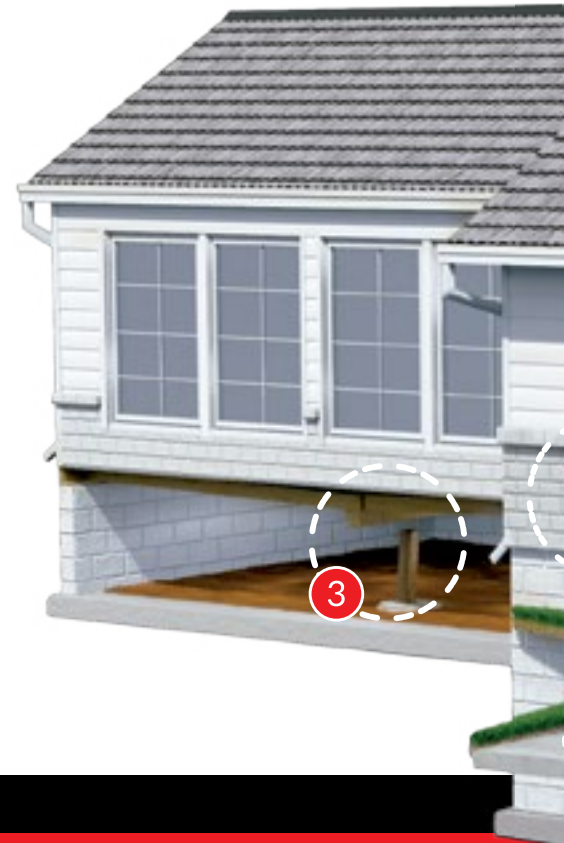

The mission of St. Lucie County's Tourism Division is to improve the overall economic condition of the St. Lucie County through activities, special events, marketing and expanding tourism within St. Lucie County as a year-round destination.

The Tourism Division is responsible for

developing and implementing plans and strategies, in coordination with State and local agencies that will increase tourism through year-round tourist programs for the community. The division will coordinate and unify marketing activities and expand tourism events/business.

St. Lucie County's Tourist Development Council (TDC) is represented by local elected officials, hospitality professionals and tourism-related community members.

The TDC serves as an advisory committee to the St. Lucie County's Board of County Commissioners. The TDC appointed seats are comprised of three elected officials, three representatives from accommodations collecting the tourist tax, and three representatives from tourism-related industries, as directed by Florida Statutes 125.0104.

St. Lucie County has a 5 percent tourist tax collected on accommodations rented for six months or less. The funding is allocated in the following manner:

- First & Second Cents - Operation and maintenance of St. Lucie County's Sports Complex
- Third Cent - Promote Tourism
- Fourth Cent - Pay debt service on bonds used to finance the reconstruction and renovation of the St. Lucie County Sports Complex
- Fifth Cent - 67 percent of the 5th cent tax is allocated to pay debt service on bonds issued to finance the renovation and reconstruction of the St. Lucie County Sports Complex. The remaining 33 percent of the 5th cent tax is allocated for capital facilities that promote tourism located north of Midway Road.

The TDC meets every second Wednesday of the month at 1:30 p.m. in Conference Room 3 of the Roger Poitras Administration Building, 2300 Virginia Ave., Fort Pierce.

If you have a chronic medical condition that requires constant medical care and need help evacuating during an emergency, you may be eligible for placement in Martin County's Special Needs Shelter.

The Red Cross of Martin County coordinates hurricane shelters for residents in need. Going to a shelter should be a last resort. The Red Cross urges residents to find alternate options including staying with local friends in a safe area. Please monitor local media for shelter information.

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) offers guidance preparing for and responding to public health hazards and emergencies including natural disasters, bio-terrorism and chemical emergencies.

The Medical Reserve Corps offers medical and non medical volunteers are needed to provide support in our community for a variety of public health initiatives.

Martin County Fire Rescue is excited to announce a new public Emergency Notification system, called CodeRED. This allows Emergency Management personnel to send Public Safety messages, evacuation notices, and other timely warnings, by phone, text, and/or email.

To sign up for CodeRED notifications and allow phone, text, or email information for delivery of important Public

Safety messages and/or severe weather warnings.

The Florida Department of Health in Martin County offers a wide range of services that focus on improving and maintaining the health of residents and visitors. The Florida Department of Health in Martin County Care Coordinators work with you to schedule the services you may need and connect you with community programs including:

- Breast feeding and childbirth education
- Parenting education and support
- Smoking cessation assistance
- Nutritional services and counseling
- Psychosocial counseling

55+ Community Lifestyles

55+ Communities, which sometimes may be called age qualified communities, active adult housing, age-restricted communities or age-segregated communities, are communities with an age restriction for residence.

These communities range from apartment complexes or condos, to single-family homes in a gated community, and 55+ communities are typically have community amenities such as clubhouses, fitness centers, tennis courts, pools and spas, game rooms, golf course access, cooking classes, and other community amenities.

55+ community homes are often designed with the needs of aging residents. Both the home and the community are designed with accessibility and safety in mind.

Homes in 55+ communities tend to be smaller, single-level detached houses or multifamily houses with one or two bedrooms and one or two bathrooms. Homes also often have accessible bathroom features, and other floor plan features that are more accessible so that seniors can age in place.

Communities tend to be close to shopping centers, restaurants, churches and libraries, as well as recreation areas, and offer safety features such as community gates and security patrol. One of the



many benefits of living in communities for active seniors is the low maintenance lifestyle.

Homeowners associations are often charged with the responsibility of maintenance of community amenities and landscaping. Community associations also may offer or cover community activities, home insurance, transportation services, some utilities and cable, and other services to community members. 55+ Community Restrictions and Requirements tend to require at least one spouse at or over 55, although each community has different requirements for residency. These communities often have many residents who are quite actively still employed and working.

Homeowner associations typically have covenants of which residents must abide by which maintain the home values and ensure a safe and friendly community for all residents. Additionally, there are often rules which prevent residents from allowing children and others under 55 from becoming permanent residents.

55+ community homes are typically bought, not rented, although there are many communities nationwide who offer the option of renting, rather than just buying and many communities have monthly or yearly resident fees, which pay for services provided by the community.

Communities range from communities with limited support, to communities with on-site healthcare services. In addition to these services, seniors may choose to receive services from in-home senior care providers who bring senior health care services and support services to the senior's residence.

They may be freestanding community, a section of a continuing care community, nursing home, or an addition to an independent living community.

Taxes

Florida does not have an income or inheritance tax. State retail tax is 6% with food and prescription drugs being exempt.

Talk with you local realtor about property tax rates for the areas you are looking at property or a home. Every person who owns and resides on real property in Florida on January 1 and makes the property his or her permanent residence is eligible to receive a homestead exemption up to \$50,00. The first \$25,000 applies to all property taxes, including school district taxes. The additional exemption up to \$25,000, applies to the assessed value between \$50,000 and \$75,000 and only to non-school taxes.

Motor Vehicles

In the state of Florida, a motor vehicle is required by law to be registered within ten days of the owner either becoming employed, placing children in public school, or establishing residency. Registering your motor vehicle goes hand in hand with the titling process. Motorboats must be registered within 30 days of possession. Fees vary depending on the size of the vessel.

Drivers License

If you have an out-of-state license, you may be able to convert it to a Florida driver's license without having to take a written or road test. Please visit our website, www.GatherGoGet.com for a complete listing of documents needed and other information related to obtaining your driver license or ID card. For a complete list of fees, also see www.flhsmv.gov

The Division of Driver Licenses, Bureau

of Field Operations, has driver license offices located throughout the state. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Appointments are provided at all full service offices. Check the Driver License Office Directory on www.flhsmv.gov for addresses, telephone numbers, days and operating hours. Appointments are recommended.

Vehicle Registration

The following list will get you started:

- Obtain vehicle insurance from a company licensed to do business in Florida. In other words, visit a Florida insurance agent.
- Take proof of identity (required for all owners), proof of Florida insurance, original out-of-state title, and verification of physical inspection of the motor vehicle's *vehicle identification number (VIN), completed on a form HSMV 82040 (available on the website), Application for Certificate of Title With/Without Registration, to your local Florida county tax collector's office. Find locations and hours by county at:

When applying for title, ALL owners are required to sign a completed application for title (HSMV 82040). If an owner is



unable to sign the form in the presence of a tax collector employee, he/she may sign his/her appropriate portion of the form and give to the co-owner for submission to the agency.

Remember: proof of identity is required for all owners.

Boat Registration

New motorboats must be registered within 30 days of possession. Fees vary depending on the size of the vessel. The out-of-state vessel owner who plans to remain permanently in Florida must advise the county tax collector. They will receive a Florida registration number to replace those issued by the state of former residence. The out-of-state registration be surrendered to the tax collector, and certificate of title, if issued, must and number for vessels owned by Out-of-state registration, certificates military personnel on active duty in Florida are valid in Florida until the expiration date, after which the vessels must be registered in the State of Florida. Visit www.flhsmv.gov for more information and fees.

Voter Registration

You can apply for voter registration while doing your driver license business! A driver licenses examiner will ask you if you would like to apply for voter registration, change your address or party affiliation and provide you with an application of registration or cahnges at the time you receive your license. Your voter registration application is then forwarded to your local county supervisor of elections office. Your official registration card will be mailed later from your local supervisor of elections office.

Note: You cannot apply for voter registration unless you are a U.S. citizen. A lawful permanent resident, alien non-resident or other non-immigrant is not a U.S. citizen for purposes of voter registration.

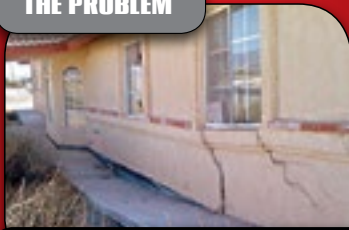

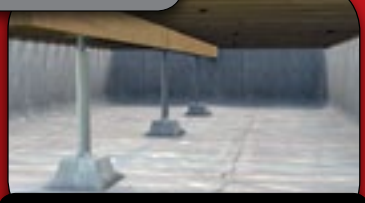
